2009 MONDAY MORNING QUARTERBACK CLUB SPEAKERS

SEPTEMBER 14, 2009 – GENE STALLINGS

A Paris, Texas native, Gene Stallings was hired as Head Football Coach at The University of Alabama on January 11, 1990. In only his third season, Stallings and his staff produced Alabama's first perfect regular season since 1979 by going 12-0. The team went on to defeat Miami in the Sugar Bowl and capture the national championship. Prior to his arrival at Alabama, Coach Stallings was Head Football Coach of the St. Louis Cardinals. The Cardinals moved to Phoenix in 1988. Coach Stallings led the Cardinals for four years.



In 1972, Coach Stallings joined Tom Landry and the Dallas Cowboys. During his years there, Dallas won seven division titles, three conference championships and the 1978 Super Bowl. For seven years, Coach Stallings was Head Football Coach of his alma mater, Texas A&M. Coach Stallings spent his collegiate playing days under Coach Paul Bryant at Texas A&M and was one of the Aggies who endured the now famous Junction training camp in 1954.

SEPTEMBER 21, 2009 – GENE CHIZIK

Gene Chizik is in his first year as the head football coach at Auburn after serving in the same capacity the past two seasons at Iowa State. A 23-year coaching veteran, Chizik was Auburn's defensive coordinator from 2002-04, where he helped guide the Tigers to a 13-0 season in 2004 while earning the Frank Broyles Award as the nation's top assistant coach. He also served as the assistant head coach and co-defensive coordinator at Texas from 2005-06 where he helped the Longhorns to a perfect season and national championship in 2005.



Chizik's reputation as an outstanding teacher is evident by the fact that he tutored a remarkable three consecutive Thorpe Award winners, starting with Auburn's Carlos Rogers in 2004, followed by Texas' Michael Huff and Aaron Ross in 2005 and 2006. He began his coaching career as defensive coordinator (1986-88) at Seminole High School in St. Petersburg, Fla., before becoming a graduate assistant at Clemson for a pair of 10-win teams in 1988-89. Chizik's first full-time college coaching position came at Middle Tennessee State, where he helped lead the Blue Raiders to NCAA Division I-AA playoffs in both of his seasons (1990-91) and to a conference championship in 1990.

SEPTEMBER 28, 2009 – TONY BARNHART

Noted college football journalist Tony Barnhart joined ESPN in 1993 as a "Halftime Blitz" reporter on the network's Thursday Night Game of the Week. Beginning with the 1997 season, he also became a regular reporter on the acclaimed College GameDay each Saturday. Since July of 1987, Barnhart has been the college sports editor of The Atlanta Journal-Constitution, considered one of the nation's best daily newspapers. He previously spent three years as the assistant sports editor, as well as a college sports beat writer.



Barnhart came to Atlanta in 1984 from the Greensboro (N.C.) News & Record, where he focused on ACC football and men's basketball for eight years. He's also been a college football correspondent for The Sporting News, and is the current southern correspondent for Football News. Barnhart also was the screenwriter for "The Southern Game," a 1996 documentary on southern college football produced by Georgia Public Television. The piece was nominated for a southern region Emmy. He's currently working on turning the documentary into a book entitled "Southern Fried Football."

OCTOBER 5, 2009 – HOWARD SCHNELLENBERGER

By 2008 Head Coach Howard Schnellenberger had welcomed the first recruiting class; climbed the ranks of Division I-AA, including a national semi-final appearance; joined a conference and began playing football in the country's highest classification, the Bowl Subdivision; and grabbed a league title and two bowl championships to add to his collection.



When you consider all the "firsts" that Florida Atlantic University's football team has accomplished, it is hard to believe. What may be even more difficult to comprehend is the legendary Head Coach Howard Schnellenberger accomplished a "first" as well in 2007. When the 74-year-old program builder was named 2007 Sun Belt Coach of the Year, it marked the first time he had earned a conference award. Schnellenberger has resurrected two programs from virtual extinction. Neither was affiliated with a conference. Schnellenberger has been part of four college national championships, 1983 with the Miami Hurricanes, and while being the offensive coordinator for Paul "Bear" Bryant when the Crimson Tide won championships in 1961, 1964 and 1965.

OCTOBER 12, 2009 – BOBBY BOWDEN

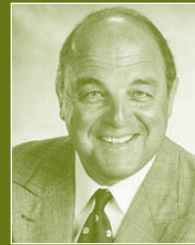
Bobby Bowden, a Birmingham native, is the current head college football coach of the Florida State University Seminoles. Since taking the position in 1976, Bowden has led FSU to an Associated Press and Coaches Poll National Title in 1993 and a BCS National Championship National Title in 1999, as well as twelve Atlantic Coast Conference championships since FSU joined the conference in 1991.



Bowden (with 382 career wins) is currently 1 win behind Joe Paterno (383 career wins) as the all-time winningest Division I-FBS coach by total victories. A March 6, 2009 NCAA ruling requiring Florida State to "vacate any games in which an ineligible player participated" caused the school to vacate 14 of Bowden's wins from the 2006 and 2007 seasons in relation to an academic scandal. As of July 2009, Florida State is appealing the ruling, which would leave Bowden with 368 career wins. Bowden, along with Joe Paterno, Chris Ault, and John Gagliardi, is one of four active coaches who have also been inducted in to the College Football Hall of Fame.

OCTOBER 19, 2009 – BARRY ALVAREZ

Barry Alvarez was born December 30, 1946 in Langeloth, Pennsylvania and is a retired college football head coach and current Director of Athletics at the University of Wisconsin. On July 28, 2005, Alvarez announced that after the 2005 season he would step down as head coach. Alvarez named then defensive coordinator Bret Bielema as his successor.



Alvarez concluded his career at Wisconsin with a win over the Auburn Tigers in the 2006 Capital One Bowl, bringing his all-time record at Wisconsin to 118-73-4 (.615), with three Rose Bowl wins and an 8-3 (.727) record in bowl games, the best winning percentage ever for a coach in Division I-A bowl games (minimum 11 bowl games coached). On October 13, 2006, a bronze statue of Alvarez was unveiled in the Kellner Plaza of Camp Randall Stadium. The statue honoring Alvarez had been announced the previous year, at his last home game as head coach. During the 2006-07 bowl season, Alvarez worked as a color commentator/analyst for FOX Sports. He worked on both the Tostitos Fiesta Bowl and BCS National Championship Game.

OCTOBER 26, 2009 – NICK SABAN

During only his 2nd year as head coach of the Tide, Saban finished the regular season undefeated as he led the Crimson Tide to its first SEC western division championship since 1999, first undefeated regular season 12-0 since 1994 and the team's first Sugar Bowl since 1993, while accumulating a record of 19-8. However, because of NCAA sanctions due to textbook violations, 5 wins from the 2007 season were vacated marking Saban's record at 14-8.



Saban has previously served as head coach of the National Football League's Miami Dolphins and three other NCAA universities: LSU, Michigan State and Toledo. His eight-year contract for a total of \$32 million made him one of the highest paid college football coaches in the United States at the time. He appeared on the September 1, 2008 cover of Forbes magazine as "Sports' most powerful coach". Saban's career record as a collegiate head coach is 105-50-1.

NOVEMBER 2, 2009 – MIKE SLIVE

From his early days as an athletic administrator to his current post as commissioner, Mike Slive has maintained an integral role in the ever-changing world of intercollegiate athletics. He was named the seventh commissioner of the Southeastern Conference on July 2, 2002.



Since becoming SEC Commissioner, Slive has created committees within the SEC that are designed to assist member institutions in the operations of its athletics departments as well as how athletics operations fit within the academic mission of universities. Slive was instrumental in the development of the Sportsmanship and Fan Behavior Summit, a national forum held in February 2003, which brought together athletic, community and civic leaders as well as specialists to talk about sportsmanship and how to prevent inappropriate fan behavior. Slive also has developed an initiative to ensure gender and ethnic diversity in the SEC.

NOVEMBER 9, 2009 – IVAN MAISEL

Ivan Maisel is a senior writer for ESPN.com, covering college football. In addition, he appears on ESPN-NEWS, ESPN Radio (where he is a weekly guest on The Colin Cowherd Show during the fall) and the ESPN-NU College Football Insider podcasts. Maisel hosts a regular podcast with Beano Cook, which airs weekly from August through January and monthly the rest of the year.



Maisel has been honored three times for "Best Story" by the Football Writers Association of America, most recently in 2006 for an ESPN.com feature about the effects of Hurricane Katrina on the Tulane football program. He also shared an award for the "Best Enterprise Story" from the Associated Press Sports Editors while at Newsday. He served as president of the Football Writers Association of America in 1995.

Maisel is the co-author of A War in Dixie, Alabama v. Auburn (HarperCollins, 2001) and has written The Maisel Report: The Most Overrated and Underrated Players, Coaches, Games, Stadiums, and Traditions in College Football, to be published by Triumph Books in the fall of 2008.

NOVEMBER 16, 2009 – DAN REEVES

Coach Dan Reeves was born January 19, 1944 in Rome, Georgia and a former American football player and head coach. He coached, and lost, four Super Bowls: Super Bowl XXI (1986), Super Bowl XXII (1987) and Super Bowl XXIV (1989) as the Denver Broncos' head coach, and Super Bowl XXXIII (1999) as the head coach of the Atlanta Falcons.



Reeves currently covers NFL games as a color analyst (teamed with play-by-play man Bill Rosinski) for the second Sunday afternoon game on Westwood One radio network. In addition to his work on the radio broadcast, Dan Reeves also speaks at corporate and football events around the country.

NOVEMBER 23, 2009 – RECE DAVIS

Rece Davis joined ESPN in March 1995 as an ESPN2 SportSmash anchor, providing five-minute news and score reports throughout the network's nightly programming.



He now serves as studio host for ESPN and ESPN2's coverage of college football and college basketball, including duties as anchor and host of the NCAA Women's Basketball Championship and college basketball's weekly College GameDay. He has served as host of ESPN and ESPN2's College GameDay Final since August 1999 and College Gamenight – ESPN's daily college basketball news and highlights program – Baseball Tonight and anchors SportsCenter.
